There was a lot of research conducted back then (The Stanford Prison Experiment, Milgram's shock study) that wouldn't be allowed today thanks to the ethical guidelines we now have. Spotlight on ... Feminism

If you decide to study sociology, you will learn about three major perspectives, Functionalism, Marxism and Feminism. There are four main types of feminism which you can research <a href="here">here</a>. Feminism refers to a perspective that recognises and opposes patriarchy (the male dominance of society) and that argues for the rights of women. Feminist theorists have thoughts on lots of areas of sociology, education, crime, religion and the family. Feminists like Ann Oakley argue that the family is an institution that preserves the social order and only benefits only a powerful group within society. For feminists, this group is men.
