TASKS

TASK ONE: Following looking over the requirements for theft and the scenario on the guidance sheet, you should now select a side of the argument you are on. If you think Charlie is guilty you will be the prosecution, if you think Charlie is innocent you will be part of the defence. You now need to spend the time you have been allocated producing a poster for your side of the argument to either prosecute (he's guilty) or defend (he's not guilty) Charlie. Once you have selected your side of the argument use the information below that matches the side you have selected to support you to build your argument

TASK TWO: In Ken's scenario can you identify if he has committed theft, burglary or robbery? Make notes to explain why you have selected a particular crime. To help you with this task you may wish to look back at the previous scenario and identify the similarities and differences. Identifying the differences will help you to see which offence Ken will be guilty of.
